

EASTER SUNDAY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD

What a week it has been. I hope you were able to fully immerse yourself with the events of Jesus these past seven days. It never ceases to amaze me what the Father asked the Son to do. He asked his Son to give of his own life that From The Desk Of we might live. In real life, this does not happen too often, but sometimes, it does happen that one person offers to die for someone else. St. Maximillion Kolbe comes to mind. He was a Polish priest in Auschwitz during Hitler's reign. One man had escaped, and five men were chosen to die to provide an example to the rest.

One man, a young man, was chosen. He had a wife and kids. St. Kolbe said he would be willing to die, taking the place of the man. He and the others were put in a room and starved to death. The Nazis opened the room two weeks later, and St. Maximillion was the only one still alive. The Nazis then executed him. Some years later, this same man was at the beatification of Maximillion Kolbe, giving testament to what this saintly priest had done. To give one's life so that another might live. Many of us have given ourselves to loving and caring for others so that they might live. I think of a mom and dad working many hours to provide for their kids. It is good to give of ourselves in service of one another and ultimately for God.

I saw the movie Cabrini with Brother Gene and Fr. Rodney last week. It is a very good movie about a woman from Italy, a religious sister, who works night and day helping people. She and her sisters come to America to work for the Italians in 5 Points, New York City. At every point of her heroic life, this poor sister is confronted with racism. At this time, Italians were some of the last to enter America, and because of this, they were rudely treated. It is amazing how Sr. Frances Cabrini dealt with it all. She stood her ground every time; she was not easily intimidated and stood up to so many, and eventually, God's plan fell into place. When she first started her journey, others told her she needed to succeed for women's rights. If she failed, it would prove, once again, to chauvinistic men that women were not up to the task of leadership. Well, her will proved stronger than any man she encountered. What a marvelous woman she was. I talk about St. Frances today because the world can still be chauvinistic.

In today's Gospel, Mary Magdelene is a lot like St. Frances. She stood below the cross and discovered the empty tomb. All the men had run away in fear, but she remained. I think it is important to thank the women in our world in our church, in our parish, for the leadership and hard work they provide. And so, I thank the women of this parish for their commitment and dedication. It is much appreciated.

BAPTISM GUIDELINES:

Newborn -6 years old. A parent or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation class, instruction materials are provided.

Ages 7 – 10: The child must attend special Baptism preparation classes and the parent(s) or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation session prior to the ceremony.

Ages 11 - 17: The young person must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Children (RCIC) program.

Age 18 and Older: The Candidate must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) program.

MATRIMONY – Engaged couples, seeking to be married at the Rock Church, must meet with the Pastor before setting a date.

RCIA/RCIC – ARE YOU SOMEONE OR DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO...

- Has expressed an interest in becoming Catholic?
- Has a child over the age of seven who has not been baptized?
- Was baptized Catholic as a child, but has not celebrated the Sacraments of **Confirmation and Eucharist?**

We offer an opportunity to come together in a group to learn more about the Catholic Faith. Sessions focus on the teachings and experience of the Church and prepare individuals to celebrate the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. There are separate sessions for children and youth. You are welcome to participate in the process with your questions, insights and your faith story in a warm accepting setting.

LITURGY NOTES



The word "**Easter**" comes from Old English, meaning simply the "East." The sun which rises in the East, bringing light, warmth, and hope, is a symbol for the Christian of the rising Christ, who is the true Light of the world. The Paschal Candle used during the Easter Vigil is a central seaster Sunday 3 31 2024 symbol of this divine light, which is Christ. It is kept near the ambo throughout Easter Time and lit for all liturgical celebrations.

The Easter Vigil is the "Mother of All Vigils," and Easter Sunday is the greatest of all Sundays. The season of Easter is the most important of all liturgical times, which Catholics celebrate as the Lord's resurrection from the dead, culminating in his Ascension to the Father and sending of the Holy Spirit upon the Church. The octave of Easter comprises the eight days, which stretch from the first to the second Sunday. It is a way of prolonging the joy of the initial day. There are 50 days of Easter, from the first Sunday to Pentecost. It is characterized, above all, by the joy of glorified life and the victory over death expressed most fully in the great resounding cry of the Christian: Alleluia! All faith flows from faith in the resurrection: *"If Christ has not been raised, then empty is our preaching; empty, too, is your faith." (1 Cor 15:14)*

What you sow is not brought to life unless it dies. And what you sow is not the body that is to be, but a bare kernel of wheat, perhaps, or some other kind; So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown corruptible; it is raised incorruptible. It is sown dishonorable; it is raised glorious. It is sown weak; it is raised powerful. It is sown as a natural body; it is raised as a spiritual body. If there is a natural body, there is also a spiritual one.

So, too, it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being," the last Adam a life-giving spirit. But the spiritual was not first; rather, the natural and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, earthly; the second man, from heaven. As was the earthly one, so also are the earthly, and as is the heavenly one, so also are the heavenly. Just as we have borne the image of the earthly one, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly one." (1 Cor 15:36-37, 42-49)


